The Historic Preservation Board (HPB) of the City of Titusville, Florida met in regular session at City Hall in the Council Chamber, located at 555 South Washington Avenue on Monday February 3, 2025 at 1:00 p.m.

Chairman Kiesel called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Present were, Vice Chairman Petyk, Secretary Adams, Member Shifalo, Member Jonas, Member Gaetjens, Member Foster and Alternate Member Davis. Alternate Member Crofton was absent. Also attending were Redevelopment Planner Sue Williams, Planner Tabitha Armstrong and Sr. Administrative Assistant Kim Amick.

Vice Chairman Petyk motioned to approve the minutes from the January 6, 2025 meeting as presented. Member Shifalo seconded. There was a unanimous voice vote in favor.

Florida Division of Historic Resources Small Matching Grant

Brad Parrish gave an explanation of the grant and suggested that the board consider applying for the grant again this year and funded for next year.

The Historic Preservation Board members discussed the grant and how it would help them enable the community of Joynerville recognize the past and help them maintain what is still there. They discussed community education, interpretive signage and consistent design to mark the locations throughout the community. A walking tour was discussed as a possible successful program, but it was discussed that before they get to the stage of a walking tour they would have to identify where it would be, what kind of signage and how they would like to have it and the community should be involved in making those decisions.

Vice-Chairman Petyk asked if \$50,000 is enough. Brad Parrish stated they would look at the whole project, estimate what that might cost and only the grant will subsidize that portion up to the maximum grant and then what left the city will put in for a budget request. He stated with this grant they believe there are going to be more funds necessary so they will put that request in with the budget and if council approves it in September, it will be effective October in time when the grant is received.

Chairman Kiesel stated it looks like the consensus is to move forward with the grant.

There was a unanimous voice vote to move forward with the grant.

Recognition of Historic Structures Without Designation.

Chairman Kiesel stated they have the revised form they asked for at their previous meeting in the packet.

Chairman Kiesel asked if they were going to do the round table at the end of the meeting. Sue Williams stated yes.

HPB Annual Workshop May 22, 2025

Chairman Kiesel stated at their last meeting some were going to be looking for some speakers and some ideas for topics.

Member Davis stated he had a suggestion to bring in a couple of men from the Melbourne area that were involved in the Line Street Cemetery discovery and cleanup. There was a Boy Scout Troop that helped with the clean up and he is working to get the two men how were instrumental in getting that troop to that area of discovery. He is working that angle and feels he will be able to get one of the men to participate. He hopes to have information before the workshop in May.

Member Foster stated what is the focus of the workshop. Is it going to be on Joynerville project, who handling it, or is it going to present to them the public tools or practices what can be done to ensure that a community is represented as they want to be in the historical content.

Member Davis stated the main thing is community awareness and education. This would be a way to highlight an example of what another city has done to bring that home to Titusville to focus on encouraging their help and getting the young people involved.

Chairman Kiesel stated his concern is there are only two more meetings before the workshop, and they do not have a defined agenda. All they have is some possible topics, an announcement of the grant application and their recognition without designation and he does not know if they can build a workshop around just those two topics.

Vice-Chairman Petyk suggested doing (1) Black Cemetery, (2) Businesses and (3) People who are getting recognized can speak about their houses.

Alternate Member Davis will get information to Sue to distribute.

Member Foster The importance of neighborhood cemetery and recording it and noting some of the prominent people buried in the cemetery and the importance of cemeteries and the stories they tell. Also the history of local businesses and have someone talk about the black businesses in the Joynerville area and the ones carried on by family members and the Joynerville project how they are caring forward.

Sue Williams stated regarding the Line Street Cemetery, she talked to the planner, Sandy, who recommended to bring in Pat Tyjeski in to tell the whole story. Pat Tyjeski is the one who gave the presentation at Melbourne. The cost for Pat Tyjeski to present would be \$1,300.00 and she is available for the date of May 22 at 5:30.

Chairman Kiesel stated that is a great starting point if they can get a tie into our cemeteries as well as local businesses and get them confirmed by the next meeting. He thinks they have enough of an agenda for a good workshop. He said they could talk about the grant they are trying to do to move Joynerville forward and briefly discuss their Recognition without Designation program.

Vice-Chairman Petyk made a motion to invite Pat Tyjeski to speak at their workshop on May 22, 2025.

Member Foster seconded.

Member Shifalo stated she is pleased that the board is moving forward with Recognition without Designation. She would also like to see something done for the early space age recognition and also wanted to mention historic neon signs to do something to preserve them.

Member Foster stated the Florida Trust is having their workshop on May 17 designation at the Elliott Museum. She is going to set up an information table with what they have done. Also, at the Brevard County Historic Commission meeting last week, she took a copy of their Joynerville report and guidelines, they thought they were great. They asked if a copy of both could be put in the archives at the historic commission for people to review. She would like to request that they put a copy of each in the archives at the Brevard County Historic Commission at the Cocoa Central Library.

Member Foster two recommendations were two motels (1) Three Oaks, 707 S. Hopkins Avenue and (2) Sunrise Inn, 605 S. Washington Avenue.

Member Jonas suggested naming two commercial and two residential.

This is the background for discussion at the March 3, 2025 Workshop.

Summary Explanation & Background:

During the June 3, 2024, Historic Preservation Board (HPB) meeting, it was the consensus of the Board that the members would research ways to recognize historic structures without being locally or nationally designated and bring those ideas back to the HPB at the July 1, 2024 meeting for discussion.

During the July 1, 2024 HPB meeting, it was the consensus for staff to provide a draft sample certificate of recognition and the Historic Preservation Board will discuss the certificate, procedures and criteria for the recognition at the August 5, 2024, meeting.

The staff researched the process the Brevard Heritage Council Board members utilized during their recognition process. Each Board member researched one property to nominate, spoke with the owner and verified the property information utilizing public records. The Brevard Heritage Council hosted a recognition/celebration ceremony for recipients during their annual meeting in the evening with refreshments. The number of recipients would vary, normally between 2-4 at each recognition ceremony. Each recipient was able to speak about the renovation or rehabilitation of their property, providing valuable information to the Brevard Heritage Council Board members.

During the August 5, 2024, HPB meeting, there was consensus to pursue the recognition of the historic structures. There was also a consensus that the Board members need to come up with a process so that it is done correctly. The HPB Board tabled the discussion until the October 2024 HPB meeting. After discussion at the October 7, 2024, meeting regarding the process and criteria, the HPB tabled this for further discussion at the November 2024 HPB meeting. During the November 4, 2024 HPB Meeting, the Board decided they would like a form for the criteria. Member Foster stated she had a form the Brevard heritage Council utilized and would submit it to the staff. The Historic Preservation board reviewed the forms at the December 2, 2024, meeting and provided direction to staff. The staff created a form for the HPB.

The Historic Preservation Board discussed having a round-table meeting to choose possible structures for recognition and presenting the certificates at the HPB Annual Workshop in May. During the January 6, 2025 HPB meeting, there was a consensus to hold the round table meeting directly after the February 3, 2025, Historic Preservation Board meeting is adjourned. There was also a consensus during the January 6, 2025 HPB meeting that each Board Member would bring forward 2 recommendations each for historic structures for recognition without designation for discussion at the roundtable, to narrow the nominations to 4 total to be recognized at the HPB Annual Workshop on May 22, 2025 at 5:30 at the Harry T. Moore Center.

During the February 3, 2025, Historic Preservation Board workshop, the HPB members each gave two recommendations each for historic structures for recognition without designation. There was consensus at the February 3, 2025, workshop to review the recommendations, host another workshop on March 3, 2025, and collectively decide on four (4) total subject properties at the March workshop utilizing the completed applications submitted by the board members. The board members who recommended the four (4) properties will contact the nominees to invite them to the May 22, 2025 Annual Workshop.

Summary Explanation & Background:

At the January 6, 2025 Historic Preservation Board (HPB) meeting there was a consensus to hold the HPB Annual Workshop on May 22, 2025 at the Harry T. Moore Center at 5:30PM if this date did not conflict with NAACP May 2025 meeting. Staff confirmed the NAACP meeting in May is May 15, 2025. Staff confirmed the Harry T. Moore Center is available on May 22, 2025, and reserved the location. There was also a consensus to have possibly three speakers from the Joynerville community to share their stories at the Annual Workshop. Member Davis stated he would contact a few different individuals discussed at the January 6, 2025 meeting regarding speaking at the Annual Meeting regarding the Joynerville Community. This item was discussed at the February 3, 2025, meeting, and it was the consensus to have a panel of 3 speak if possible at the Annual Workshop.

The HPB Board members expressed interest in the Line Street Grant presentation in Melbourne in December 2024. Staff researched the Line Street Grant presentation and cost. The HPB Board approved the Line Street Cemetery presentation for the Annual Workshop. Staff confirmed Patricia A. Tyjeski, AICP, will present on May 22, 2025. The cost is approximately \$1,300.00.

At the January 6, 2025 Historic Preservation Board meeting there was consensus the HPB Board would present four (4) recognitions without designation at the Annual Workshop. Details to be addressed in the February and March round-table Historic Preservation Board workshops.

Items to be addressed are how the HPB Board wants the Annual Workshop to be advertised. Please provide the wording of the title of the workshop.

In the past, staff at the direction of the HPB Board mailed postcards to the historic and contributing addresses in Titusville and distributed flyers to CRA properties and other

interested parties (churches, museums, etc). Staff also advertises via social media outlets, newsletters, electronic signs, etc. The estimated cost of marketing the annual workshop is \$1000.00 for maximum exposure.

Light refreshments have been served in the past. Cost will be approximately \$200.00.

A draft agenda timeline for the HPB Annual Workshop is attached for review.

PROPOSAL

OUR BEGINNING

Since 2015, a collaborative project called "Newtown Alive" began documenting the rich, 100-year history of Overtown and Newtown and African American residents' courage and enterprise in surviving Jim Crow policies and laws. The City of Sarasota awarded Vickie O! Heritage Productions, Inc, a Florida non-profit, tax exempt organization the contract to jumpstart the initiative.

In less than three years, Vickie Oldham, a consultant for the City of Sarasota completed Phase 1 and 2 deliverables (**a research report, oral history interviews, inventory of historic resources, markers, web pages, heritage trail brochures, and a mobile app**). Creatively, a team of experts and volunteer researchers helped gather primary and secondary source documents to produce the research report.

COMMUNITY PARTNERS

The initiative was leveraged to attract community partners. A Tampa-based advertising agency, Trickey Jennus, donated services to create a logo for branding purposes. Additional community partners such as Sarasota County Government added value to the project and helped increase its growing list of educational materials about Sarasota's African American history and pioneers through its Neighborhood Grants program. The Florida Humanities Council funded the development of podcasts.

NEWTOWN ALIVE'S DIGITAL IMPRINT

A **website** was launched to make materials accessible to users worldwide. The Florida Humanities Council provided funding for a **podcast series**. Recordings of oral history interviews were transferred into podcasts and posted. Information about **15 historic markers** with addresses is available on the website and the Newtown Alive **mobile app**. **Digitized monthly newsletters** are posted on the website. The **social media posts** are updated by an intern.

NEWTOWN ALIVE BOOK

The research report is the foundation upon which a book was published with an expansive body of historical materials.

NEWTOWN ALIVE TROLLEY TOURS

Trolley tours of the historic Newtown and Overtown neighborhoods led by Oldham with pioneers stepping onboard to tell personal stories began in 2017. The tours are an illustration about how the seed money was leveraged. Community scholars, Newtown residents and freedom song leaders are paid to assist with tours.

A segment of the tour traces the route of Newtown activists whose caravans led to the eventual integration of all county beaches. **On January 21, 2019, the efforts of Sarasota NAACP legends and caravan participants highlighted during the tours were added as an official site on the U.S. Civil Rights Trail.** The Newtown Alive tour is listed as a stop on Blacks in Travel and Tourism's U.S. Black Cultural Heritage Road Trip on June 1, 2020.

SCHOOL / COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Vickie O! Heritage Productions produced a traveling exhibition, two short documentary films and community scholars present lectures and workshops to members of civic organizations. A project of include local history in the 4th grade social studies curriculum is underway. A mural initiative was launched on April 15 to place wall art on buildings in Sarasota's first African American community known as Overtown. Today, it is gentrified and its name was change for rebranding.

CULTURAL ART CENTER AND HISTORY MUSUEM

A cultural arts center in Newtown was recommended by Oldham as a next step. More than 10 years ago, Newtown residents discussed the idea with city leaders. At the completion of Phase 2, Oldham presented a proposal to the Sarasota City Commissioners, and on October 15, 2018 commissioners voted unanimously to proceed. The Leonard Reid House will be moved in August, 2021 and serve as a temporary home of the art center and museum until a permanent location is identified. Trolley tours will be launched at this site. A new cultural asset will be added to Sarasota's inventory.

VICKIE OLDHAM'S BIOGRAPHY

Vickie Oldham enjoys great storytelling. She is foremost a journalist. Oldham is spearheading a groundbreaking historic preservation project called "Newtown Alive." What began as an initiative to trace the 100-year history of Sarasota's African American communities of Overtown and Newtown expanded into cultural heritage tourism. Residents and visitors are taking a second look at one of the town's oldest neighborhoods through the lens of history.

A comprehensive 350-page research report was completed and later reformatted into a book. Other products include 15 historic markers placed in locales that tell stories about the resilience of local African American pioneers. There is a documentary short, a guided trolley tour, a traveling exhibition, walking tour brochures, newtownalive.org, a mobile application, videotaped oral history interviews, an inventory of 150 historic structures, a speakers' bureau and a podcast series featuring Newtown history makers.

In 2019, the U.S. Civil Rights Trail listed a new entry - the Sarasota NAACP's car caravans to integrate Sarasota County beaches. Oldham submitted the proposal.

The Florida Trust for Historic Preservation honored Oldham's team with an outstanding achievement award.

Oldham's propensity for asking questions is the impetus that led to the exploration of another preservation project. In 2004, she spearheaded "Looking for Angola." Multi-disciplinary in its approach, archaeologists, anthropologists and historians are piecing together the story of a little known and almost forgotten 1800's Black Seminole settlement that existed in the Tampa Bay region.

The site of archaeological research in east Bradenton is now listed on the Underground Railroad Network to Freedom; and in January 2020 a \$100,000 grant opens the way for further study.

The Sarasota resident made her mark as a reporter and TV host at the local ABC affiliate after receiving a bachelor's degree in telecommunications at the University of Florida and a master of fine arts degree at Florida State University's Conservatory of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts. She hosted a popular TV program called *Common Ground*, interviewed some of the country's most recognized newsmakers and has appeared in numerous commercials, including an ABC network primetime drama.

A career transition led her into higher education in 2006.
